





Image caption: Abraham Lincoln delivering his Gettysburg Address, a pivotal moment in his pursuit of peace during the American Civil War.



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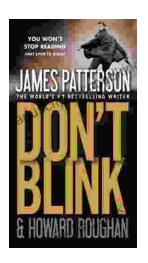
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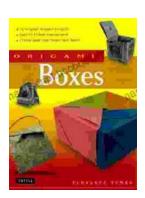
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
